Hopefully, by the time you read this column you have enjoyed a beverage from Starbucks, a meal from Arpeggio and a stroll on the trail around the beautiful and greatly anticipated Spring House Village Center. CVS is open and we anticipate additional excitement when Whole Foods opens its doors in Spring 2018. The Board of Supervisors thanks you for your patience during construction. Temporary inconvenience will happily yield permanent improvement!

Speaking of strolling, the Crossways Trail officially opened in January. This joint project with Whitpain Township provides a connection to Whitpain trails on the north end, crosses the Wissahickon Creek via a spectacular 8 foot wide bridge going south, and joins the Green Ribbon Trail at the entrance to Penllyn Woods. Additionally, the Board is scheduled to connect the new Spring House Village Shopping Center to the Penllyn Pike trail. This connection will include another bridge over Willow Run, which will be added to our trail system as part of the construction of the Carriages at Lower Gwynedd. As I pen this column LGT is poised to take ownership of the former Texaco station at the corner of Sumneytown and Bethlehem Pikes. A notable eyesore will be transformed into attractive open space at the gateway to our community. These additions to the Township's open space and trails prove that economic growth and preservation of natural resources, greenways and trails are not incompatible. The

Board remains committed to a walkable, green and connected community.



Notes from the Fire Marshal

As we enjoy Summer, we know that Fall and Winter will soon be upon us. Now is the time to prepare for those seasons. Each winter, fireplaces or chimneys are found to be the source of damaging fires. This year, please consider doing the following before the heating season:

- Have your fireplace and chimney checked by a Chimney Sweep or Chimney specialist.
- Repair any cracks or damage before using the fireplace or chimney again
- Make sure the Chimney is clean. Studies have shown that one fire in a chimney will cause enough damage to require reconstruction of the chimney

This is also a good time to check your fire warning systems, specifically:

- Have your annual fire alarm system check completed. Annual service greatly reduces false system activations
- Consider changing any kitchen smoke detectors to heat detectors to reduce the possibility of a visit from your volunteers because of smoke from burned toast.

On a general note, please make sure that you have your house number installed and clearly visible from the street. At the street, they should be at least 4 inches high, with a 1/2 inch stroke on a contrasting background. If the building is not visible from the street, put an address sign at the street to facilitate identification.

For those residents with long driveways:

- Make sure vegetation is trimmed to at least 12 feet in width, 14 feet clear height
- If you have a bridge on your property. It must be evaluated by a professional engineer with the weight limit posted at the bridge.
- If you have a gate on your driveway, it must have clearance of 12 feet to allow for fire apparatus access. The gate must open or have an emergency release for emergency access.

Finally, open burning is not permitted in the Township at any time. Chimeneas and other manufactured fireplaces are permitted. Any fireplace that is constructed on site requires a building permit.

Lower Gwynedd Police Department News



On July 25, 2017, the Lower Gwynedd Township Police Department joined the ranks of 111 accredited agencies in Pennsylvania. The process involved a two year undertaking of changing policies and operating procedures to mirror the best practices set forward by the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Council. Earlier this year, three members of the council spent two days in Lower Gwynedd to ensure the department reached the required benchmarks. Their report was confirmed by the council in Harrisburg on July 25, 2017 and accreditation status was granted. Currently, only ten percent of Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Agencies are accredited. Congratulations to Chief Paul Kenny, Accreditation Manager Officer Tim Evard and all of the members of the Lower Gwynedd Police Department for achieving this lofty goal.

Vehicle Thefts and Thefts from Vehicles

- The Lower Gwynedd Police Department has detected a trend locally that matches a national trend of an increase of vehicle thefts and thefts from vehicles.
- Lock the doors and close the windows. Don't make it easy for a thief to break in or reach in and snatch anything of value. Make it a habit to double check that your doors are locked and your windows are closed when parking your vehicle. The majority of thefts from vehicles are happening when owners leave the vehicle unlocked.
- Don't leave your car running. It can be tempting to leave your car running when you're just popping in and out of the store, but this also makes it pretty easy for a thief to hop in and drive away.
- Park in well-lit areas. If you're parking your car somewhere after the sun has gone down, try to find a spot underneath a streetlight that's well-lit and well trafficked. Thieves may be less likely to rummage through a car with a spotlight on them and a potential audience just around the corner. Consider using motion lights if you park your vehicle in your driveway.
- Hide any valuables. Better yet, avoid keeping valuables in your car at all. If a thief must choose between a seemingly empty car and one with a laptop, cell phone, or wallet on the passenger seat, guess which one they'll choose? If you must leave something important in your car, put it in your trunk before you reach your destination. Experienced thieves have been known to stake out parking lots, look for drivers transferring things to their car trunk, and then break into the trunk. This is especially true at gym parking lots.
- Invest in an anti-theft system. Whether it's a steering wheel lock, a window alarm, or an ignition cut-off system, anything that makes a thief work harder could also make your car safer. If it will slow them down or potentially get them caught, they'll probably pass.

2017 Waste and Recycling Collection Services

Dear Lower Gwynedd Township Resident,

Waste Management is proud to provide you with automated cart services for waste and recycling collection. We look forward to keeping your community—clean and green—in 2017 and beyond.



Twice-a-Week Waste Collection: Monday and Thursday

- · Household trash MUST be in bags, to reduce spillage. Place all bags inside your trash cart.
- Place cart in the street by 6:00 a.m. on collection day, but no earlier than 7:00 p.m. the evening prior.
- Place cart with wheels and handle toward the curb. Be sure the lid is closed!
- Please keep 4 feet between the carts, and 4 feet away from trees, cars, mailbox, poles, etc.

Once-a-Week Single-Stream Recycling Collection:

- · Place all recyclables in the green cart with yellow lid. Bags can be used to reduce spillage during collection.
- Place cart in the street by 6:00 a.m. on collection day, but no earlier than 7:00 p.m. the evening prior.
- Place cart with wheels and handle toward the curb. Be sure the lid is closed!
- Please keep 4 feet between the carts, and 4 feet away from trees, cars, mailbox, poles, etc.

Bulk Item Collection: Thursday ONLY

- · One bulk item per week is accepted at no charge, but must be scheduled. Extra bulk items may be scheduled for a \$30 fee.
- · Bulk item examples: renovation or construction debris, furniture, mattress, washer, dryer, desk, etc.
- Any item with FREON, CFCs, HCFCs, or liquids MUST be scheduled for separate pick-up.

Yard Waste Collection: Monday and Thursday

- Yard waste can be grass clippings, leaves, small branches, etc. and must be bagged. NO dirt or rocks accepted.
- Weekly yard waste pickup is limited to 4 bags. Place bags at the curb on collection day.

FALL Leaf and Yard Waste Special Collection:

- Fall collection allows for an 8 bag limit for pickup on special collection dates.
- ALL YARD AND LEAF WASTE MUST BE IN BIODEGRADABLE BAGS.
- 2017 Fall Collection Dates: October 7 and 14; November 11 and 18; December 9 and 16.

Holiday Schedule:

The following holidays are observed by Waste Management:

New Year's Day • Memorial Day • Fourth of July • Labor Day • Thanksgiving Day • Christmas Day

When a holiday falls on a collection day, collection will occur on the next business day.

Household Hazardous Wastes are NOT ACCEPTED.

Toxic chemicals, pesticides, oil-based paints, weed killers, automotive batteries, fuels or fluids must be disposed of properly. Refer to the Township website or Montgomery County Recycling website (below) for locations and dates.

Electronics CANNOT be disposed as Waste!

Due to PA State Law, we will not pick up ANY TV, cell phones, computer, printer, monitor, or any device which can connect to a computer. Refer to the Town- ship website or Montgomery County Recycling web-site for locations and dates.

Fall Leaf/Yard Waste Collection Dates

Lower Gwynedd Township has a leaf and yard waste recycling program where our contracted hauler, Waste Management, provides curbside leaf/yard waste collection opportunities throughout the Spring and Fall. The current contract provides for eight collections dates, two in the Spring and six in the Fall. The six scheduled dates for this Fall are:

- · Saturday, October 7th & October 14th
- · Saturday, November 11th & November 18th
- Saturday December 9th & December 16th

All leaf and yard waste must be placed in biodegradable bags and there is a limit of eight bags per pick-up.

Green Infrastructure

In the Wissahickon Watershed, many municipalities are investing in a practice called "green infrastructure." Green infrastructure is an approach to water management that protects, restores, or mimics the natural water cycle. The Wissahickon Creek suffers from what is known as the "urban creek syndrome," which means it experiences flash floods, elevated concentrations of pollutants, impaired habitat and reduced species biodiversity due to suburban development. However, green infrastructure is a valuable tool to counterbalance these side effects in a way that is effective, economical, and enhances community safety and quality of life.

Green infrastructure incorporates both the natural environment and engineered systems to mitigate flooding and erosion, filter pollutants from rain water that flows off the land, and improve groundwater recharge. On the local level, green infrastructure practices include rain gardens, planting tree buffers along the creek, restoring wetlands and floodplains, and retrofitting stormwater basins. Lower Gwynedd Township is currently working on a basin naturalization and rain garden installation project located on the municipal complex site. The project received grant funding through the Growing Greener Program. These projects will help protect the Wissahickon Creek and our community!




Sewer Billing Clerk Retires / Outsourcing Sewer Billing Proposal Approved

Lower Gwynedd Township's Sewer Billing Clerk, Linda Melnick, retired in May of 2017. Linda was responsible for the processing of all sewer bills, collection of sewer payments, entering water meter readings and cash receipts, as well as the general maintenance of sewer database including updating customer accounts as needed, preparing reports, issuing sewer certifications to title companies, and providing back-up telephone support and general administrative duties. Linda joined the Township staff in 2012 and has been an outstanding employee during her five years of service. The Lower Gwynedd Township Board of Supervisors and Staff would like to thank Linda for her service and congratulate her on her retirement.

As a result of Ms. Melnick's retirement, the Lower Gwynedd Township Board of Supervisors voted to approve outsourcing sewer billing and collection services at their meeting held April 25th, 2017. The billing and collection responsibilities had historically been handled in-house, but when the current billing clerk announced her plans to retire outsourcing was investigated. After fully analyzing the position and the responsibilities associated with such, it was determined that perhaps the Township would be better served by having the billing performed by a third-party. A request for proposals was issued and the Township Manager recommended that the board consider the proposal submitted by the Bucks County Water and Sewer Authority (BCWSA) as they are familiar with the Township's system and proposed the lowest cost for processing. Part of the outsourcing project also involves the conversion of the sewer database. That specific item will have a one-time data conversion software cost. The process of database conversion is underway and it is anticipated that beginning in early 2018 all sewer bills will be issued and payments received and processed through the BCWSA. Lower Gwynedd Township will no longer accept or process payments once the transition occurs. All sewer billing inquires, payments, and related information will be handled directly through BCWSA. Additional details and information will be distributed to residents in the coming months as we make this transition.

Below is a depiction of what the new sewer bills will look like moving forward.





Public Works

Mailboxes – Mailboxes should be installed in accordance to U.S. Postal Standards. Mailboxes that are not installed in accordance to US Postal Standards and are struck by a Township plow during snow removal operations will be the sole responsibility of the property owner to repair.



Leaves – Leaves that are not bagged should not be placed in Township roadways. Leaves that are placed in the street can become a traffic hazard, block storm inlets and pipes which can result in flooding in poor drainage areas. Please check the Townships website for when the Township Waste Management Company will be picking up leaves that are placed in biodegradable bags curb side.



Landscaping – Landscaping adjacent to Township roadways shall be maintained to allow safe passage of residents and motor vehicles. Landscaping that protrudes out into the roadway and does not meet the minimum height requirement is considered a safety hazard. It is the abutting property owner's responsibility to maintain. The Public Works Department recommends that all landscaping be maintained a minimum of 12 inches behind the edge of roadway or curb line and to a minimum height of 13 feet.



Snow Removal – During winter snow or ice events the Public Works request that residents keep the roadways adjacent to their property clear of any obstructions. Vehicles and trash receptacles are considered an obstruction and prohibit the public works department from efficiently clearing the roadway. When the Township declares a snow emergency all residents that have off street parking must remove their vehicles from the Township roadways. Plowing or throwing snow out into Township Roadways is strictly prohibited.

Lower Gwynedd Business Association Update

Business Association Forms Beautification Committee

The Lower Gwynedd Business Association (LGBA) has formed a Spring House Beautification Committee to discuss and develop solutions for improving the aesthetics of the business district along Bethlehem Pike in Spring House. The mission of this newly formed committee is to collaborate with the appropriate local and state government entities, community groups and the businesses themselves to make Spring House a more attractive shopping destination.

According to committee member Hilary Goodman, owner of Born to Run, the businesses along the Pike would like to see Spring House become more competitive with nearby communities like Chestnut Hill and Doylestown.



"Businesses along the pike want to attract local residents to shop in their stores, eat in their restaurants, and utilize their services," shared Goodman. "By enhancing the look of the area, and making it more pedestrian-friendly, we think it will encourage Lower Gwynedd residents to shop local."

Enhancements being explored include pedestrian crosswalks, flower planters, streetscapes, and storefront cleanup. Costs for these improvements are being identified, as are available volunteer resources, grants, and other funding sources.

The committee is conducting regular meetings at The Sierchio Financial Group office to brainstorm and identify feasible initiatives which can be implemented in the near and long-term. Members of the Beautification Committee include Connie Brick, of the Sierchio Financial Group; Jay Gelman, from Heits Building Services Mid-Atlantic; Hilary Goodman, from Born to Run; Chris Lux, with Harth Builders; and Debbie Ryan, with Spring House Travel. Kathleen Hunsicker, Vice Chair of the Board of Supervisors, is the township liaison to the committee.

Lower Gwynedd Township began a series of beautification projects in 2008. Through various grants and township matches, over 1.5 million dollars was invested in the construction of sidewalks, installation of post-and-rail fences, and landscaping along the Pike. The "I Like the Pike" campaign, spearheaded by Vice-Chair Hunsicker in 2012, sought to market investment opportunities along the Bethlehem Pike corridor while promoting current businesses and launching the LGBA.

The timing of this initiative coincides nicely with the renovation to the Spring House Village Shopping Center which will be anchored by Whole Foods market. Construction is projected to be completed on the shopping center in first quarter of 2018. Once complete, the renovated shopping center will attract consumers to the area. This beautification project aims to capitalize on the increased activity by creating a positive shopping experience for consumers along the Pike from Moore Drive to Dager Road.


Cancellation Policy:





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
