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I'm happy to share that a lot has happened in Lower Gwynedd in the last quarter! We amended our police hiring practices to ensure greater transparency when bringing new officers into our community. In May, we welcomed four new police officers to our township. The addition of these new officers allowed our Police Department to develop a Community Response Unit (CRU) that focuses on addressing community concerns and providing community education. Some duties of the CRU include:

- Community/Town Hall meetings with seniors to educate them on fraud, scams, and theft;
- Combatting the opioid epidemic with treatment programs and education
- Traffic complaints and accident investigation; and
- Interacting with our youth to promote positive relationships and reduce juvenile crime and drug use.

Throughout the summer, our Police Department engaged in conversations with our community and community partners while enjoying Kona Ice. We also facilitated backpack giveaways to help families prepare for the school year.

We kicked off June by raising the Pride Flag for the first time in Lower Gwynedd, and the board passed an anti-discrimination ordinance and approved the development of a Human Relations Commission ("HRC"). The HRC will not only be a resource to resolve disputes, it will also promote equity within our Township through education and community outreach.

In July, we joined many neighboring municipalities in establishing a Clean Energy Resolution, which commits our township to reach 100% clean energy for electricity by 2035 and heat and transportation by 2050. The resolution also includes an action to create a "committee, task force, and/or enlist a consultant" to draft an energy transition plan to meet the resolution's energy objectives. The board is currently seeking individuals in the community who have a passion, interest, and/or some expertise in the area of clean energy and climate change to serve on the team which will develop the transition plan to help our municipality reduce greenhouse gas emissions, effectively deploy taxpayer dollars, and advance community goals for health and safety. Please visit our website if interested in volunteering. We also announced our first annual native tree giveaway, which will take place on October 1, 2022. Keep a lookout for more information on how you can sign up to receive your free tree and help us grow our tree canopy.

We are actively planning for our future and in the midst of embarking upon a review of our comprehensive plan. We have applied for multiple grants to plan for upgrading our parks, adding needed sidewalks, a pedestrian bridge, and trail connections, developing a bus shelter along the Gwynedd Friends' Meetinghouse property, updating traffic signals, and mitigating stormwater throughout our Township. We are also working with our engineers and members of our community to review the flooding experienced in the Brookside and Francis Avenue neighborhoods.

We enjoyed seeing so many friends and neighbors come out to our Summer Concert Series throughout the summer in Oxford Park, and we are

Smoke Detector Recycling

Smoke detectors are a life-saving device that should be in everyone's home. Smoke detectors have an expiration date—10 years for smoke detectors and 5 to7 years for combination smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. So how do you dispose of an expired smoke detector?

The answer to this question depends on the type of smoke detector. There are two types of smoke detectors: ionizing and photoelectric.

- Ionizing smoke detectors use a tiny amount of a radioactive isotope and electrically charged plates to detect smoke. When smoke enters the detector, it stops the flow of ions between the two electrically charged plates, causing the alarm to sound. Ionizing smoke detectors are best at detecting flaming fires.
- Photoelectric smoke detectors contain a light sensor and a light aimed away from the sensor. When smoke enters the detector, the light is reflected onto the light sensor, causing the alarm to sound. Photoelectric smoke detectors are best at detecting smoldering fires.

There are also dual sensors which contain both types of detectors in one unit. You can identify the type of smoke detector by looking at the back. If you see a radioactive symbol (pictured to the right), then you have an ionizing or dual sensor smoke detector. The back of the smoke detector has the manufacture date, which you can use to determine the expiration date.

Smoke detectors are not accepted at Montgomery County household

hazardous waste or E-waste recycling events or drop-off locations. Photoelectric smoke detectors can be thrown in your household trash after removing the battery. Due to the radioactive material in ionizing smoke detectors, they must be recycled; however, they cannot be put into a household recycling



bin. There are two options for properly recycling ionized or dual sensor smoke detectors:

Return to manufacturer: many companies will accept their brand of ionizing smoke detectors for recycling. The United States Postal Service provides a list of manufacturers that accept smoke detectors and their addresses. You must pay for postage and, in some cases, a small fee for recycling. Google provides a free shipping label to recycle their Google Nest smoke detectors.

Smoke detector recycling kit: Curie Environmental Services offers a smoke detector recycling kit to recycle ionizing smoke detectors, regardless of brand. The kits include proper shipping materials and paid postage. The kit will be shipped to your home, and you can simply add your smoke detectors (battery removed) and drop off with the shipping carrier listed on the postage.

FIRE SERVICE IN LOWER GWYNEDD TOWNSHIP

Lower Gwynedd Township is served by two all-volunteer fire companies—Wissahickon of Ambler and North Penn of North Wales. The companies are staffed by your friends and neighbors in the area. All have received extensive training in fire and rescue services. They are dispatched through the Emergency Operations Center of Montgomery County through the 9-1-1 dispatch system.

Each of the fire companies has a fire station in the Township. Each of the companies are non-profit corporations which operate with tax money from Lower Gwynedd and from the two Boroughs served (Ambler and North Wales). In addition to the tax money, the fire companies operate fund drives to supplement the needs of operation. Both companies mail fund drive solicitations to their primary coverage areas and hope you will help them provide these services to the Township.

This description seems quite ordinary until you look at some of the facts:

- The companies respond to an average of one call a day in the Township for assistance. They pride themselves by achieving the national standard of placing a fire truck on location in 9 minutes from the time the call is placed on 9-1-1—Day or night, 365 days a year.
- In addition to the responses in the Township, these companies also respond in the boroughs and surrounding areas, averaging another call per day.
- The fire companies engage in thousands of hours of training to prepare for a wide variety of emergencies that could occur within the Township. This training is at company level, county level and for some state level and national training.
- The fire companies engage in planning and preparation for possible problems that could occur within the Township—developing preplans to anticipate problems that could be encountered and prepare possible solutions.
- The fire companies also maintain their equipment—apparatus, buildings and necessary equipment—operating like any other business with corporate officers, budgets and various regulations.

In summary, fire service in Lower Gwynedd Township is provided by two trained and prepared fire companies who pride themselves in providing the Township with excellent service on an all-volunteer basis—with emphasis on the all-volunteer. Each company would be happy to have you stop by their stations to find out more, or better yet to volunteer. It may sound like work, but it's also very rewarding to help your neighbors.

Stormwater Management

Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination Inspections

Under the municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4) permit, Lower Gwynedd Township is required to screen a portion of the Township's outfalls each year of the 5-year permit cycle. Stormwater and certain authorized types of uncontaminated non-stormwater are the only discharges that should enter a municipal storm sewer system. That is why it is important not to dump anything down a storm drain! Lower Gwynedd Township's Engineer, Gilmore Associates, performed outfall screenings this summer. The inspectors conducted dry-weather screenings of MS4 outfalls to evaluate the presences of illicit discharges. It is important to remember not to dump anything in the storm drain, as this will eventually make its way to the creek and pollute our water source! If you see anyone illegally dumping, we ask that you report this to the Township. In October, our Environmental Advisory Council will conduct a storm drain stenciling outreach project to bring awareness to the importance of not dumping anything down storm drains because they run to the creek!

Land Development & Subdivision Update:

Below is a summary of the various land development and subdivision projects currently being reviewed, approved, or under construction within Lower Gwynedd Township at the time of this publication.

Preliminary Review

- <u>601 Knight Road-Waiver of Land Development (#22-04WLD):</u> Institutional; Location-601 Knight Road (Wissahickon High School); Applicant-Wissahickon School District; Summary-A plan to construct new synthetic turf ball fields to replace existing grass ball fields and install associated stormwater management facilities. Under review.
- <u>1501 Cedar Hill Road Minor Subdivision (#22-02SUBD)</u>: Residential subdivision; Location 1501 Cedar Hill Road; Applicant-Robert & Cheryl Mastromatto; Summary-A plan to subdivide a 3.5- acre parcel into two individual lots with an area of open space. The existing dwelling and accessory building will remain on lot-1 and lot-2 will be a new building lot. The proposed plan is currently under review.
- <u>St. Charles Borromeo Seminary Land Development (GMU Campus) (#21-04LD):</u> Institutional land development; Location- 1325 Sumneytown Pk-GMU; Applicant-St. Charles Seminary; Summary- Proposal to consolidate two parcels within the campus and add a new college residence hall with a chapel, new student life center, and a new maintenance building. Future plans for a gym and an additional building are also shown on the plans. Additional improvements including parking facilities, access drive, landscaping, lighting and stormwater management facilities are also proposed. The plan was recommended for preliminary/final approval to the Board of Supervisors. Approval pending.
- <u>1500-1524 Cedar Hill Road Land Development (#20-06LD)</u>: Residential development; Location- Cedar Hill Rd.; Applicant-Jon Mayer; Summary- A plan to consolidate 3 parcels, remove existing structures, and then subdivide combined parcels into 12 individual singlefamily residential lots under a cluster option available through conditional use. The lots will be accessed from three private drives off of Cedar Hill Rd. Sidewalk along Cedar Hill Rd, stormwater management facilities, and open space areas are included with the proposed plan. Applicant has decided to file a different plan and use the by-right development criteria for these parcels. The development is now proposed to be a 7-lot single family residential development. Under review.
- <u>301 Norristown Road Land Development (Gwynedd Estates-ACTS) (#20-04LD)</u>: Multi-family residential development; Location-301 Norristown Rd-Gwynedd Estates; Applicant-Acts; Summary- A plan to add a new skilled nursing wing at the NE corner of the site and to reconfigure the existing parking area while also adding new parking, and to add subsurface stormwater management facilities. Under review.

Approved/Under Construction

- <u>601 Knight Road-Waiver of Land Development (#22-03WLD)</u>: Institutional; Location-500 Houston Road (Wissahickon Middle School); Applicant-Wissahickon School District; Summary- A plan to remove the swimming pool within the natatorium building and replace it with six classrooms and additional bathroom renovations. Approved 7/26/2022.
- <u>1612 N. Bethlehem Pike Land Development (Precision Watches & Jewelry) (#21-03LD)</u>: Non-residential commercial development; Location-1612 N. Bethlehem Pk; Applicant-Precision Watches & Jewelry; Summary- A commercial development that includes the construction of a 2.5-story jewelry store with associated parking and stormwater management facilities. Approved 5/24/22.
- <u>812 N. Bethlehem Pike-Waiver of Land Development (#22-01WLD)</u>: Non-residential redevelopment; Location-812 N. Bethlehem Pike; Applicant-Harth Builders; Summary-a plan to redevelop the existing site and relocate business (Harth Builders) to this property. The proposed plan is to renovate the existing building and construct an addition for retail use, enhance the entrance and add a terrace, reconfigure and add parking spaces to the site, and also add sidewalk. Applicant requested a waiver of land development for phase one of the project, future phases will be subject to land development. Approved 3/14/22.
- John's Lane Subdivision (#21-02SUBD): Residential development; Location-776 John's Lane; Applicant-Martin & Marnie Hughes; Summary: A 6-lot single-family residential subdivision and land development with 5 new homes proposed and 1 lot to remain vacant. The proposed lots will take access off of a private road with a cul-de-sac from the intersection of John's Lane and Susquehanna Road. Stormwater management facilities, landscaping, and other associated improvements proposed. Approved 11/23/21.
- <u>820 N. Bethlehem Pike (Goddard School) Land Development (#21-01LD):</u> Non-residential redevelopment; Location-820 N. Bethlehem Pike; Applicant-Beth Pike LLC; Summary- A non-residential redevelopment of this property that will include the removal of the existing Pike Diner, construction of a new daycare center and the repurposing of an existing building into a medical office along with the associated site improvements. Approved 10/12/21-Under Construction.

The map indicates the location of all the trails, trail distance, parking areas, trail surfacing, and contains photos at trailheads and trail junctions. The Township will update the map as information changes or new information becomes available.

There is a tutorial on the website as to how to use the map. Using the navigation technology through Google Maps allows residents to have a clearer understanding of their location and orientation as to the direction they are walking. Lower Gwynedd Township Dog Ordinance

Just a reminder that Lower Gwynedd Township has an ordinance that specifies letting dogs run loose without a leash is prohibited. All dogs must be on a leash of no more than ten feet when on streets, public grounds or property (see ordinance below). This includes all parks and ball fields.

§ 620.02 Dog regulations. [Ord. 77. Passed 8-17-1964; Ord. 407. Passed 2-18-2003]

- (a) Dogs at Large Prohibited. [Amended 8-23-2016 by Ord. No. 509]
- (1) As used in this Section 620.02, the term "at large" shall refer to any dog that is not restrained by the dog's owner or keeper with a leash having a length of not more than 10 feet.
- (2) It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any dog, licensed or unlicensed, to permit such dog to run at large over the streets, public grounds or property, or upon the private property of anyone other than the owner or person having custody of the dog or of the property of anyone who has consented to the dog being at large on their property. The owner or keeper of the dog must be of appropriate age and discretion to properly control the actions of the dog.

Snow Removal

During Snow or Ice Events please help Township Crews by remembering the following tips:

- Move your vehicle out of the street and into private driveways. This helps Snow plows fully clear the road and it is less snow you have to shovel.
- During any snow emergency as declared by the Township, all vehicles must be removed from the roadway.
- If possible, wait to shovel your driveway until plows have completed their final pass along the curb line or edge of pavement. A pass or two through the neighborhood does not mean the Township is finished plowing snow.
- Shovel to the right-hand side of your driveway (right side coming from your house) to reduce the amount of snow pushed back onto your driveway by the plow.
- Clear your sidewalk by shoveling and salting within 24 hours of the last evidence of precipitation.
- Do not throw snow from any sidewalk or driveway into the roadway, it is illegal and you may be cited.
- Please don't pull your car onto the roadway to clear the snow from the vehicle.
- Please don't place your trash and recycling receptacles in the street.
- If you have a storm water inlet in front of your property, please assist the Township in keeping it clear of snow and ice. This will prevent ice and reduce drainage issues when the snow begins to melt.
- If you have a fire hydrant on your property, please clear the snow all around the hydrant so the firefighters can more quickly connect to it. This could save lives and property.

Please be patient during the snow removal process while the Township's plow operators work to clear the roadway.

Mailboxes

Please inspect mailboxes before the winter. Mailboxes should be at least 6 inches behind the curb line or edge of pavement. Mailbox should be securely mounted to the post. The post should be securely mounted in the ground and the post should be checked for rot or damage at or near the base. The Township is not responsible for any damage that may occur to an improperly installed or previously damaged mailbox.
